#### OVERVIEW OF THE 1991 ANNUAL MEETING

### Paul Allen Beck, Ohio State University

The 49th Annual Meeting of the Midwest Political Science Association, to be held in Chicago on April 18-20, will be a qualitatively different professional meeting from the ones I first attended in the 1960s or from the first MPSA meetings held almost half a century ago. It will contain 160 different panels, representing the variety in substantive focus and method that has become a hallmark of our discipline. Its almost 900 panelists will come from virtually every American state and a few foreign nations, from large universities as well as small colleges, from academic institutions and nonacademic research and policy positions to which political scientists have increasingly been drawn in recent decades. This rich diversity in panelists is more evidence that the Midwest Meetings have outgrown their original roots. Midwestern in name only, they have become important national meetings for political scientists. Diversity also is reflected in the theme of the 1991 Annual Meeting, "The Interdisciplinary Foundations of Political Science." Our discipline has drawn in significant ways on other disciplines (biology, economics, history, linguistics, psychology, sociology, just to name a few) for both theory and method. The interdisciplinary theme is designed to acknowledge these contributions and to examine their importance -- past, present, and future -to political science. This theme is expressed in substantive panels scattered throughout the program. The principal vehicle for expressing this theme, though, is a plenary session to be held on Thursday, April 18, at 8:30 p.m. Entitled "The Interdisciplinary Foundations of Political Science," this session will bring together, in roundtable format, four prominent political scientists -- Donald Stokes of Princeton University, Russell Hardin of the University of Chicago, David Sears of UCLA, and John Sprague of Washington University, St. Louis -- to discuss the influence of other disciplines on our enterprise, particularly the specific disciplines which have been significant for their own scholarly research. It should be a lively and informative evening; and we will cap if off with a reception, sponsored by the Midwest Association, for panelists and audience.

# Convention Information

Palmer House The Palmer House is one of the finest hotels in Chicago. Its many services include six restaurants, lounges, health club with steam, sauna, and whirlpool, indoor swimming pool, and fifteen retail shops. It is also located along the State Street Mall, one of the many retail centers in Chicago. The Palmer House personnel will be happy to assist in any way that they can to help insure that your stay here is a pleasant one. Maps of the Palmer House meeting locations can be found on the inside front and back covers of the program booklet. Convention Registration: To participate in the meetings, you must register. Registration for the meeting will be in the back of the lower exhibit hall, just two escalator flights up from the hotel lobby. Registration fees for the meeting: Members: \$20. Student Members: \$10. Nonmembers: \$30. Nonmember students: \$15. Membership in the association is still a bargain at \$20 per year (\$12 for students and retired) and includes a subscription to the American Journal of Political Science. Please note that we do not accept credit cards for registration fees. Convention Meetings and Events: The central location for the convention is the Lower Exhibit Hall which is located on the 3rd floor, just two escalator rides up from the hotel lobby. Registration, paper sales, and exhibits will be located in the Exhibit Hall. Panel meeting rooms Most of the panel sessions will be held on the 7th floor in the Burnham, Montrose, and Sandburg wings. A map of the 7th floor conference center can found on the inside front cover of the program. We will also be using meeting space on the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th floors for part of meeting. A map of these rooms is found on the inside back cover. Authors may retrieve any unsold papers at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday. Citation of MPSA Panel Papers: Association policy is that papers presented at the annual meeting are in the public domain and may not be restricted from citation or attribution. Placement Center: The placement center is located in the Mezzanine West area, one escalator ride up from the hotel lobby. Candidates should pay their registration fee at the meeting registration desk and then check in with the receptionist at the placement center. Schools that wish to interview should register with the receptionist. Candidates and schools will be assigned mail boxes for messages. Placement center hours of operation: Thursday, 11 am - 5 pm Friday, 9 am - 5 pm Saturday, 9 am - 3 pm Continental Breakfast: A breakfast and snack cart with free coffee or tea will be available each morning in the Exhibit Hall. Those who plan to eat light and wish to avoid a wait at the hotel restaurants may want to take advantage of this new service. Child Care Service: Our free child care service for participants in the convention is available in a hotel suite. Check at the meeting registration desk to obtain the room number and the name of the child care coordinator. Ground Transportation and Parking: Continental Air Transport runs a bus from O'Hare and Midway airports to the Palmer House and back. You may board the bus at the terminal baggage level, the same location for taxi service. The bus fare from O'Hare Airport is \$12.50 one-way, \$22.00 roundtrip; the fare is a bit lower from Midway Airport. The CTA "El" train also runs from O'Hare Airport, Terminal 4, and will take you to the Monroe station (2 blocks by underground walkway to the Palmer House). The fare is \$1.25. If you drive to the hotel, economical parking is available in the Grant Park or Monroe Street garages, located in between Michigan Avenue and Lake Shore Drive. Palmer House guests can obtain "discount" (by downtown standards) parking in a garage at Adams and Wabash, just east of the hotel or Mid-Continental, 55 W. Monroe, just west of the hotel.
